I have also experienced such gratitude from the patrons because they appreciate how all the volunteers are there to help and support them. The thoughts of having the soup kitchen close, especially in the current climate where people are struggling to make ends meet just does not make sense to me. This may be the only place the receive a hot meal 4 times a week.

Over the years my family and I have helped not only serve in the evening, but Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve as well. The past few years the Soup Kitchen has helped serve hundreds of people on Christmas Eve and in conjunction with Dustin's Adventureland supplied gifts for many children in the county who may have not had any gifts to open on Christmas morning.

The company I work for volunteers twice a month and has organized clothing drives as well as other fundraisers to help the support the soup kitchen. We helped supply Hygiene products to all the adults and children. We also purchased rain ponchos, thermal blankets, hand warmers, socks, gloves and hats for children. We also help supply and food or supplies that are needed to make sure people are getting a hot meal.

As you can see, this Soup Kitchen is a vital part of helping people in Pottsville and closing it would have such a negative impact on the community. I am hoping that you realize how important the soup kitchen is and reconsider your decision.

My name is Cheryl Burdess, and I live in St. Clair. I'm a widow with a full-time job, and a home to maintain. But twice a month (and more if needed), I volunteer at the St. Pats, Pottsville Soup Kitchen.

Yesterday we received the news that you (Catholic Charities) wants to start running a food truck in the surrounding areas. Including Frackville, Mahanoy City and Shenendoah. I think that is wonderful to be able to help more people that can't make it to the soup kitchen in Pottsville. However, with that, you are planning to completely shut down the soup kitchen, and turn your backs on all that we have served there for over 40 years.

Granted, sometimes the crowd is smaller, between 60 and 80 patrons, but we have had nights where we have served over 100 meals to both individuals and families with small children. I have also personally done collections for these clients, including, blankets, coats, hats, gloves, toiletries, rain poncho's and canned goods. The company that I work for (Hydro-Cressona) has allowed me to do these drives, and has also contributed to all drives that we sponsor.

It would be a darn shame to have to tell these people whom we have worked so hard to help, that their ability to get a hot meal, warm up when it's cold, and cool off when it's hot is now coming to an end. I know that they can still get one meal a week from the Salvation Army, and one from the food truck, but could you live on two meals a week?

My personal belief is that everyone has something going on in their lives, and I don't pass judgement. I consider myself blessed that I can take care of myself, but there is no guarantee in life, and it makes me sad that anyone has to go without, when there are people who care, and can possibly help.

I am willing and able to help in any way I can to keep the Pottsville Soup kitchen open and serving all who have come to a point in their life that they need some help and understanding. If that means I volunteer more, than I can do that. I can also canvas for donations if that is what it takes.

Please reconsider closing the only place in Pottsville that feeds those less fortunate 4 hot meals a week.
